"Teachers have a lot of power over their students; they can help a good student become successful, or they can destroy one," he said. "Those words gave me the motivation to become a successful teacher," Hernandez said. "I want to have the power to help my students become successful teachers, engineers, attorneys or whatever it is they want to become."

Edith Ovalle is studying bilingual education and was motivated to pursue her career after struggling herself as a bilingual student. She was inspired by a fourth-grade teacher who taught her to always remind herself in times of struggle that "Education is the key to success!" "My teacher was my role model, and she will always be in my heart," said Ovalle. "Her words made me realize that education was the only way I was going

to be successful in life."

She has maintained a 3.8 GPA; is active in community service and several school clubs, including Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society; and graduated in the top 10% of her class. In the classroom she is known for her patience with students and for encouraging each of them to achieve their very best.
